A REFECTION ON FASTING by Rev. Daniel Merz

Humanity's "Fall" away from God and into sin began with eating. God had proclaimed a fast from the fruit of only one tree, the tree of knowledge of good and evil (Gen. 2:17), and Adam and Eve broke it. Fasting is here connected with the very mystery of life and death, of salvation and damnation. Food perpetuates life in this physical world, which is subject to decay and death. But God "created no death." (Wis. 1:13) Humanity, in Adam and Eve, rejected a life dependent on God alone for one that was dependent rather on "bread alone." (Dt. 8:3; Mt. 4:4; Lk. 4:4) The whole world was given to man as a kind of food, as a means to life, but "life" is meant as communion with God, not as food. ("Their god is their belly." Phil. 3:19) The tragedy is not so much that Adam

ate food, but that he ate the food for its own sake, "apart" from God and to be independent of Him. Believing that food had life in itself and thus he could be "like God." And he put his faith in food. This kind of existence seems to be built on the principle that man does indeed live "by bread alone."

Christ, however, is the new Adam. At the beginning of his ministry in the Gospel of Matthew, we read, "When He had fasted 40 days and 40 nights, He became hungry." Hunger is that state in which we realize our dependence on something else—when we face the ultimate question: "on what does my life depend?" Satan tempted both Adam and Christ, saying: Eat, for your hunger is proof that you depend entirely on food, that your life is in food. Adam believed and ate. Christ said, "Man does NOT live by bread alone." (Mt. 4:4; Lk. 4:4) This liberates us from total dependence on food, on matter, on the world. Thus, for the Christian, fasting is the only means by which man recovers his true spiritual nature. In order for fasting to be effective, then, the spirit must be a part of it. Christian fasting is not concerned with losing weight. It is a matter of prayer and the spirit. And because of that, because it is truly a place of the spirit, true fasting may well lead to temptation, and weakness and doubt and irritation. In other words, it will be a real fight between good and evil, and very likely we shall fail many times in these battles. But the very discovery of the Christian life as "fight" and "effort" is an essential aspect of fasting.

Christian tradition can name at least seven reasons for fasting:

- 1. From the beginning, God commanded some fasting, and sin entered into the world because Adam and Eve broke the fast.
- 2. For the Christian, fasting is ultimately about fasting from sin.
- 3. Fasting reveals our dependence on God and not the resources of this world.
- 4. Fasting is an ancient way of preparing for the Eucharist—the truest of foods.
- 5. Fasting is preparation for baptism (and all the sacraments)—for the reception of grace.
- 6. Fasting is a means of saving resources to give to the poor.
- 7. Fasting is a means of self-discipline, chastity, and the restraining of the appetites. God's abundant blessings

#### **Encounter Ona**


Ona always knew she wanted to be a "shining woman" in her community—and an example to her two young daughters. She studied hard and eventually earned her teaching degree from a university. But in Gaza, jobs are hard to find. Even though Ona had been a good student, she could not find work as a teacher. "The financial situation was so difficult," Ona says. "I started to feel hopeless."

That's why CRS matches workers with job opportunities. Through CRS, One applied for an internship as a teacher and was hired to teach math.

Ona knew she wanted to take full advantage of the opportunity. "I took time to ask questions and learn. I tried to better myself—and become a better teacher."

Through her internship, Ona gained the confidence and inspiration to branch out on her own. She saved enough money to open a tutoring center. She now helps students of all ages with their math skills, as well as with other subjects. After one month in business, 41 children had visited her center. "When people encourage you, you start to think in a more creative way," Ona says.

As she thinks about the future, she thinks of her children. "I hope I can be an example to my daughters. I hope that my daughters can achieve their dreams."



### SAINT OF THE WEEK St. Martin I: Died 655 Feast Day—April 13

Born in Todi and educated in Rome, this pious Italian priest was sent by Pope Theodore I as nuncio to Constantinople, where he encountered the Monothelite heresy claiming Jesus had only a divine will and was not truly human. When Martin followed Theodore as pope in 649, he convened a council that condemned this heresy and an imperial decree supporting it.

The emperor's legates tried to arrest Martin in Italy, and succeeded in 653. The already sick pope was held in solitary confinement in Constantinople, condemned for treason and scourged. ## When we have food—we eat. When we don't—we pray

How an unexpected snow on a Sunday morning in Iowa affected a nursing home in El Salvador

So it snowed. We only had 45 minutes to make our connection in Atlanta. This wasn't going to help. And then when the de-icing truck broke down we were doomed. We took off an hour and a half late and missed our connecting flight. The other 19 delegates flying from Des Moines and Moline were more fortunate and made the connection to San Salvador. We were forced to spend the night in Atlanta and were booked on the flight for the next day.

The 19 made their way to Berlin where we stay. The original plan was to have a big medical clinic on Monday. But because we had all the medicines with us in Atlanta, that wasn't possible. So the group of 19 in Berlin looked for something they could do. They asked Padre Candido, the pastor of San Jose parish in Berlin, if there was a soup kitchen or something where they could help. He said there wasn't anything like that but perhaps they could visit the nursing home in Alegria about 20 minutes away.

I hadn't thought about nursing homes in El Salvador. Family is so very important to the Salvadorans. When parents and grandparents get to the point where they can no longer care for themselves they are generally taken in by their children. But some have no family, nowhere to go. That is the case at these nursing homes; the residents are often homeless.

The nursing home in Alegria had 18 residents who were cared for by 6 Franciscan sisters. Dr. Bill consulted with each of the residents and each of the staff and prescribed medications which would be delivered after our medicines arrived. The dentists provided dental care; other delegates visited with them. Veronica asked one of the sisters how they financed the nursing home. In turns out they have no regular source of income. The residents cannot pay. So they pray for God to provide. Veronica asked about food and the sister responded, "we gather at mealtime, when we have food we eat, when we don't, we pray." At that moment, they had very little food. So a trip to the grocery store seemed in order. To the supermarket they went and the sister put food in the grocery cart. When she was done, Pam said "no, get more" The sister got more and a second

and third time was told again to get more. Sister asked if they could even get meat. "Of course, please do!" The residents were provided with food for many days. They had food and they ate. They also prayed for us.

An unexpected snow turned out to be a minor inconvenience for us. We were still able to do our 5 clinic days where we saw over 1900 people. But it was a great blessing to the

residents of the nursing home in Alegria. God truly works in mysterious ways. On behalf of the poor of El Salvador, we thank you so very much for your support of this mission.
