

From the Deacon's Desk



Celebrating Christ the King may seem a little odd in a democracy, perhaps more appropriate to the medieval period than the modern one. Plus, with trust of politicians and leaders in general at low ebb, it may even seem a bit awkward to call Jesus a king! Yet the liturgy offers beautiful images to describe what Jesus' kingship is all about, and in them we quickly discover that Jesus is a king like no other!

Today we honor Christ the king whose dominion is an everlasting dominion that shall not be taken away, (first reading). And today we praise Christ as the Alpha and the Omega, the one who is and who was and who is to come, the almighty. (second reading). In the Gospel, we learn the Jesus' kingdom does not belong to

this world—for this I was born and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. . No wonder we dream of such a king. Today's liturgy, then, offers a marvelous opportunity to explore the mystery of Christ's rule, one marked by humility, service and mercy. Our prayers should seek such gifts for not only our earthly leaders but for us as well.

Thursday is of course Thanksgiving Day. I hope you all have a wonderful day with family and friends. It is good to enjoy these special days with those we love and care about. I also hope that you will take a little time to thank God for all the blessings of your life, especially the people. I know I will say a special prayer of thanksgiving for all the members of our parish. We do have a wonderful parish and I thank God for that. I do very much enjoy working with all of you and for all of you and I am thankful for the opportunity as well as all the other blessings of my life.

As so often happens, next weekend is also the beginning of the Advent Season. It often but not always falls on Thanksgiving weekend. So after you have enjoyed the company of your friends and family, and the turkey, and the football, I hope you will take some time to consider how you will spend this Advent time in preparation to celebrate the great mystery of Christmas, Christ becoming human for our sake—they mystery of the incarnation. 

SAINT OF THE WEEK ANDREW DŨNG LAC AND COMPANIONS Memorial—November 24


Andrew Dũng-Lac was among the 117 martyrs of Vietnam killed by government of officials during persecutions to suppress European ideals and religious values in the 18th and 19th centuries. The group consisted of 96 Vietnamese and 21 foreign missionaries (11 Spanish and 10 French); the martyrs were bishops, priests, and laypeople, including a woman. They endured horri-

ble tortures in prison before being beheaded, crucified, quartered, or burned alive for refusing to deny their faith. Andrew, a Vietnamese educated in Catholicism, became a catechist and priest. He was arrested and imprisoned with his companion, St. Peter Thi; they were beheaded in 1839. St. John Paul II canonized the martyrs as a group in 1988.


A Stewardship Moment Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

The exchange between Jesus and Pilate in today's Gospel is, arguably, the most important exchange in all of literature. Pilate asks Jesus: "What have you done?" Jesus replies that he testifies to the truth. In the second reading we are reminded of the essence of that truth: Christ, ruler of all, loves us, liberates us from the bonds of sin, makes us a new kingdom. As we approach the Advent season, this week would be a good time to reflect on the question: What have we done in our daily lives, in our actions, words, private prayer, and in our interaction with others, to testify that Jesus is Lord?

Flu Season is Here

While we will not be making any changes to the liturgy at this time please keep the following in mind:

Sunday Obligation: The Obligation to attend Mass on Sunday other Holy Days of Obligation, is the ordinary expectation of Catholics. Obviously, extraordinary circumstances such as sickness, travel, or severe weather excuse the faithful from this obligation. If you are not feeling well, especially during this time of concern, please stay at home and do not risk spreading infection to others.

Sign of Peace: Members of our congregations should not be offended if someone chooses not to shake the other person's hand at the sign of peace. If you are ill (and still come to Mass), the appropriate response to someone extending a sign of peace might be to bow to them and say, "Peace be with You", to avoid bodily contact or one might wave slightly at the other person.

Reception of Holy Communion: While it is the teaching of the Church that the Fullness of the Body and Blood of Christ are contained in the Holy Eucharist, under the form of the Host that is distributed at the Mass, the Church has also extended the privilege to receive communion in the form of wine. However, if you are feeling sick, please receive communion in the hand, and refrain from receiving communion under the form of the Blood of Christ.
